

## 6th Grade Summer Bible Project

This summer, we will be doing a weekly Bible study that is specifically aimed at answering common questions about the Bible. Some of the weeks we will be focusing on sections of Scripture while other weeks we will be jumping around to look at specific verses. We will be using the **King James Version (KJV)**. You can either write or type out your answers, either is fine. A hard copy will be turned in, the first week of school next year.

### Week 1

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The best place to start with this is the beginning. Read **Genesis 1** and answer the following Questions in complete sentences.

1. Compare John 1:1-3 with Genesis chapter 1. What similarities do you see?
2. What did God say when he created new things each day?
3. In verse 27, it describes the way that God created man. What does it say?

### Week 2

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**Genesis 3** describes how sin entered the world. This event is known as The Fall. Read through this chapter and answer the following questions in complete sentences.

1. God gave Adam and Eve permission to eat of every tree but one, what was it?
2. What lie did the serpent tell Eve?
3. After Adam and Eve disobeyed God, what did they suddenly realize?
4. What was the punishment for Adam and Eve's disobedience?

### Week 3

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The last 2 weeks, we have read through 2 chapters of Genesis. These chapters have established aspects of God's character that remain true throughout Scripture. It introduces God as the creator of everything. He establishes moral standards and upholds them. He is holy, He punishes sin, and He is also shows grace to those who do not deserve it. This week, we will be looking at some of the character traits of God through various passages of Scripture. Although it is not required for this project, I encourage you to read through one of the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John) this summer, one of the best ways to understand the character of God is to look at the person of Jesus Christ.

1. Read through Psalm 8. It deals with the question of why an infinite God would care about people as small as us. It is one of my favorite Psalms in the Bible. What does it say about our response should be to the love of God?
2. Read Psalm 107:1-22. What does it say about God's willingness to save those in trouble?

### Week 4

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In week 2, we looked at how sin entered into the world and some of the consequences of the Fall. This week we will be looking at this in greater detail. This is the bad news, the good news comes next week.

1. Read Romans 3:23. What does it say about sin?
2. Read Romans 3:1-18. It describes the sinful nature of the human heart. What are some of the things listed to describe it.
3. Read Romans 6:23. "What does it say about the wages of sin?"

## Week 5

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Last week, we looked at sin and the consequences of it. We looked at the bad news, but there is good news. God sent a Savior – Jesus Christ. God sent His Son Jesus to Earth to pay the penalty for our sins and to restore the relationship between God and Man. Jesus died for your sins so that one day when you die, you can go to heaven and be with Him forever.

1. Read Romans 6:23 again. What does it say after “but?”
2. Read Romans 5:8. When does it say that Christ died for us?
3. Romans 10:9 and Romans 10:13 describe the simplicity of salvation. What does it say that you need to do to be saved?

## Week 6

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These past few weeks, we have looked at the character of God, sin, and salvation. This week’s focus is on how this affects us. In the light of the message of the Gospel, how should we live? Write out your thoughts, include Scripture to back up your claims.

1. What should our response be to all that God has done for us?
